

Pahi whakarite whenua

On Saturday 15 March, Trustees, whānau and kaimahi gathered for a whakarite whenua ceremony to mark the beginning of land being turned for the development of our Pahi at Rotoiti.

Kiley Nepia and Kereopa Baker led the whakarite whenua, beginning with a short hīkoi through the bush to the sound of birdsong before gathering in a clearing for karakia, kōrero and waiata. After the hīkoi, whānau were shown the concept drawings by our architect, and in a special moment, a pīwakawaka joined us in the gazebo — seemingly eager to get a closer look at the plans as we shared kai.

The construction of the Pahi is a significant milestone for Ngāti Apa ki te Rā Tō, carrying the legacy of our tūpuna and anchoring our presence at Rotoiti. Once completed, the Pahi will serve as a cultural space for wānanga, hui, events, and iwi activities.

A big mihi to all the whānau and trustees who attended, especially Kiley and Kereopa for leading the whakarite whenua. This marks an important step forward, and we look forward to a whakatō mauri later in the year.

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Paepae Wānanga

On Saturday 8 March, Ngāti Apa ki te Rā Tō held our second Paepae Wānanga at Te Hora Marae in Canvastown.

Building on the foundation set at our last wānanga in October, whānau from across Te Tauihu gathered to take part. Designed for all levels of Te Reo speakers, from beginners to advanced, the wānanga provided a safe and supportive environment to explore the different aspects of speaking on the paepae.

The day kicked off with interactive games and workshops to lighten the mood, fostering an atmosphere where whānau felt comfortable and confident. Ngāti Apa ki te Rā Tō waiata and karakia were practiced before breaking into groups to roleplay pōwhiri and mihi whakatau. Whānau shared the responsibilities of running the paepae, stepping into the roles of both manuhiri and hau kāinga.



The relaxed environment allowed beginners to practice karakia, while more advanced learners refined their whaikōrero.

A big mihi to all the whānau who took the time to attend the wānanga. We look forward to holding several more Paepae Wānanga in 2025, open for all whānau. Keep an eye out for upcoming dates, which will be released soon.

FROM THE CHAIR

Kia ora koutou

This is a sad day for me as this will be my final contribution to the 'Chair update' as the Chair of the iwi. My term as Chair comes to an end at the end of March, following a decision by the Board to concentrate on succession planning. New Chair Nicole Akuhata and Deputy Chair Adrian Wilson will lead us through until the AGM.

I look forward to continuing to serve the iwi as a trustee and to complete many projects that are in progress. It has been an honour and privilege to serve as your Chair, and I am especially proud of our continued growth — increasing membership, strengthening whānau engagement, growing our pūtea, and realising the aspirations you identified as priorities.

Last year, in particular, was both relentless and satisfying, with significant progress on major kaupapa such as the Base Woodbourne settlement, the South Island Customary Regulations, and The Nelson Tenths. Some projects and initiatives are still ongoing including the potential purchase of the Carters Beach archaeological dig site and the housing of the taonga recovered from there. We also continue to navigate the complexities of the Marine and Coastal Area

(Takutai Moana) Act 2011, replacing the Foreshore and Seabed Act 2004. The settlement documentary is also at the end of production, with the launch date expected in the months ahead. I acknowledge and mourn the passing of Albert Lionel Kato Te Naihi McLaren (Sonny), who features in the documentary. Additionally, our mapping project, Ngā Araru, is progressing well and once completed, I hope it will be a valuable resource for all whānau. The Pahi Project is finally making headway, and we are within sight of securing a builder and submitting plans for resource consent.

One of the key milestones achieved during my time as Chair was the completion of the tipuna list. This piece of work was started by my cousin Mahara Gilsenan, and after her death was completed by her friend Mark Moses with the assistance of Dr Peter Meihana.

The year ahead is full of opportunities for everyone to meet and I hope to see many of you at various wānanga, luncheons and dinners through the coming months.
