Tuna monitoring

Ngāti Apa ki te Rā Tō conducted the annual tuna monitoring programme at Rotoroa on Saturday 31 August 2024.

Ten hinaki nets were set throughout Rotoroa on Friday to prepare for the following day. 108 tuna were caught, weighed and measured. 10 were harvested for our hakari at the AGM, and the rest were released back into the roto.

To ensure we minimise the impact on this taonga species, the largest females (1.5-2 kg) were released back into the roto so they can continue to breed.

A big mihi to all the whānau who attended, especially matua Sam and his whānau who travelled from the North Island to share their mātauranga.

A message from Lawrence MacDonald (Kaumātua sub-Committee member)

I want to outline my reasons for putting my name forward as a representative on the Kaumātua sub-Committee. For many years I was not aware that I could be a member of Ngāti Apa ki te Rā Tō. I was at a Rangitāne AGM when I discovered that we, as Rangitāne, could also enrol as members of Ngāti Apa ki te Rā Tō.

I duly enrolled and subsequently received my membership status after my application was validated, and I happily became a recipient of all the newsletters and other items of interest.

This sparked a curious question as to who my ancestor Tarakaipa was, and how could I find out more about my Ngāti Apa ki te Rā Tō iwi. Therefore, having taken the first step in becoming a registered iwi member, the next step I took was to join the Kaumātua sub-Committee in the hope that I could not only learn more about the iwi, but also share that learned knowledge with other whānau.

The sub-Committee has helped me understand that we need to set a pathway for the future for our kaumātua. For some of us, we need to re-learn and understand our history, and be part of the rebuild for cultural revitalisation. I urge others to get involved with all that the iwi has to offer.

I am in a position where I can help our kaumātua understand the privileges and help that the iwi has to offer. There are different grants and information available to the members. Grant information is available on our iwi website, but for those of you who do not have internet access, I hope to be able to provide a list of grants and assistance available in future pānui.

There are regular wānanga that help us all understand our Ngāti Apa ki te Rā Tō history, which enables us to re-learn many cultural aspects we had previously lost. Everyone has memories, and often those memories are in danger of being lost. Share your stories, here through our pānui, so future generations have a record of how we grew up and the sorts of things we had to live through.

It is important that we stay connected, learn more about each other and our whakapapa and history, share our stories and help each other plan for our iwi future. Together we will be able to do so much.
